NOTE: This document is an evaluation of this institution's record of meeting the credit needs of its entire community, including low- and moderate-income neighborhoods, consistent with safe and sound operation of the institution. This evaluation is not, and should not be construed as, an assessment of the financial condition of this institution. The rating assigned to this institution does not represent an analysis, conclusion, or opinion of the federal financial supervisory agency concerning the safety and soundness of this financial institution.

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Overall CRA Rating

Institution's CRA Rating: This institution is rated **Satisfactory**.

The lending test is rated: Satisfactory.

The major factors that support this rating include:

- The First National Bank of Spearville's (FNB) average loan-to-deposit (LTD) ratio is reasonable given its asset size, financial condition, and lending opportunities within the bank's Assessment Area (AA).
- The institution meets the credit needs of the community with a substantial majority of loans being originated in the bank's AA.
- The bank's amount of lending to borrowers of different income levels, given the opportunities within the bank's AA, is reasonable.

Loan-to-Deposit Ratio

Considering the bank's size, financial condition, and credit needs of the AA, the bank's loan-to-deposit ratio is reasonable.

As of September 30, 2022, FNB reports an average quarterly LTD ratio of 58.1 percent while competitors reported a 61.7 percent average. Quarterly LTD ratios for the bank ranged from a low of 41.4 percent to 70.7 percent while competitors ranged from 19.9 percent to 89.7 percent. FNB's LTD ratio is reasonable compared to competitors as FNB has a lower market share in the AA due to larger competing banks with multiple offices. As of June 30, 2021, FNB only holds 4.54 percent of the market share in the AA with the three biggest competitors holding 49.3 percent.

Lending in Assessment Area

A substantial majority of the bank's loans are inside its AA.

Based upon our sample, the bank originated or purchased 90 percent of its small farm loans by number and 99 percent of total loans by dollar amount inside the bank's AAs during the evaluation period. This analysis is performed at the bank, rather than the AA, level. This percentage does not include extensions of credit by affiliates that may be considered under the other performance criteria. The few loans identified outside of the AA were made to borrowers in surrounding communities and nearby counties.

Description of Institution

FNB is a \$47 million institution located in Spearville, Kansas. The bank serves several local communities in the surrounding area. FNB has one bank location with a drive-up lane, and an automated teller machine. The bank is wholly owned by the holding company, Spearville Bancshares, Inc.

FNB designates Edwards, Ford, and Hodgeman counties in Kansas as its AA. The AA comprises one moderate-income census tract (9621.01), seven middle-income census tracts, and two upper-income census tracts. The AA complies with regulation and does not arbitrarily exclude any low- or moderate-income tracts. Please refer to Appendixes A and B for more information.

FNB faces moderate to high levels of competition in the AA. Based on the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation's (FDIC) most recent Deposit Market Share report dated June 30, 2021, FNB ranks eleventh out of twelve banks for market share in the Spearville AA with only 4.54 percent of the deposits. The top competitors in the AA include The Fidelity State Bank and Trust Company, Sunflower Bank, National Association, and Landmark National Bank, combining for 49.3 percent of the market share. Two of the top three competing institutions have multiple offices within the AA.

FNB offers a full range of commercial, commercial real estate, and consumer credit products with an emphasis on agricultural loans. As of September 30, 2022, net loans represent 47 percent of FNB's total assets. FNB's loan portfolio consists of 55 percent agricultural loans, 36 percent commercial loans, and nine percent consumer loans. FNB reported Tier 1 capital of \$6 million as of September 30, 2022.

There are no legal, financial, or other matters impeding FNB's ability to meet the credit needs of the AA. The Office of the Comptroller of the Currency last evaluated FNB's CRA performance on November 27, 2018. FNB received an overall rating of "Satisfactory" under the Small Bank Performance Standard.

Scope of the Evaluation

Evaluation Period/Products Evaluated

Examiners performed an evaluation of FNB's CRA performance using the Small Bank CRA procedures. This Performance Evaluation (PE) is an assessment of CRA performance from January 1, 2019, through December 31, 2021. FNB's primary loan product is small farm agricultural loans. The evaluation of this lending product included a review of 20 small farm agricultural loans originated by FNB during the evaluation period.

Selection of Areas for Full-Scope Review

The Spearville AA is made up of Edwards, Ford, and Hodgeman counties. Examiners performed a full-scope review of the AA. Refer to Appendix A: Scope of Examination, for more information on the full-scope AA.

Ratings

The bank's overall rating is based solely on review of the Spearville AA.

Discriminatory or Other Illegal Credit Practices Review

Pursuant to 12 CFR 25.28(c) or 195.28(c), respectively, in determining a national bank's or federal savings association's (collectively, bank) CRA rating, the OCC considers evidence of discriminatory or other illegal credit practices in any geography by the bank, or in any AA by an affiliate whose loans have been considered as part of the bank's lending performance. As part of this evaluation process, the OCC consults with other federal agencies with responsibility for compliance with the relevant laws and regulations, including the U.S. Department of Justice, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the Bureau of Consumer Financial Protection, as applicable.

The OCC has not identified that this institution (or any affiliate whose loans have been considered as part of the institution's lending performance) has engaged in discriminatory or other illegal credit practices that require consideration in this evaluation.

The CRA performance rating was not lowered as a result of these findings. We considered the nature, extent, and strength of the evidence of the practices; the extent to which institution had policies and procedures in place to prevent the practices; and the extent to which the institution has taken or has committed to take corrective action, including voluntary corrective action resulting from self-assessment; and other relevant information.

The OCC will consider any information that this institution engaged in discriminatory or other illegal credit practices, identified by or provided to the OCC before the end of the institution's next performance evaluation in that subsequent evaluation, even if the information concerns activities that occurred during the evaluation period addressed in this performance evaluation.

State Rating

State of Kansas

CRA rating for the State of Kansas: Satisfactory

The Lending Test is rated: Satisfactory

The major factors that support this rating include:

- FNB's LTD Ratio is reasonable.
- FNB originated a majority of loans inside the AA.
- The majority of FNB's small farm lending is to farms with revenues less than \$1 million.

Description of Institution's Operations in Kansas

FNB has one AA consisting of Edwards, Ford, and Hodgeman counties in Kansas. This is a non-MSA AA located in southwest Kansas. The AA meets regulatory requirements, as it consists of one whole geography and does not reflect illegal discrimination or arbitrarily exclude any low- or moderate-income geographies. The AA comprises one moderate-income census tract (9621.01), seven middle-income census tracts, and two upper-income census tracts. There were no changes to the AA during the evaluation period.

According to the most recent FDIC Deposit Market Share report, dated June 30, 2021, the AA has \$908.2 million in deposits, with FNB having a 4.54 percent market share. This ranks FNB eleventh out of twelve institutions in the AA. The top competitors in the AA include The Fidelity State Bank and Trust Company, Sunflower Bank, National Association, and Landmark National Bank, with two of these institutions having multiple offices within the AA.

The US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has declared Edwards County as a distressed and underserved area. According to the 2015 ACS US Census, in 2021 the population of the AA is 39,644 and the median family income is \$57,431. Of the 14,745 households in the AA, 25 percent receive social security, 11 percent are retired, and 13 percent are below the poverty level. Twelve percent of the population is over the age of 65 and 31 percent of the population consists of civilians not in the workforce. The median housing value is \$98,726 and 57 percent of the housing units are owner-occupied units. The income distribution for families within the AA during the review period is 24 percent low-income, 17 percent moderate-income, 19 percent middle-income, and 41 percent upper-income.

Examiners utilized two existing community contacts that have been made in the AA during the evaluation period to assess the credit needs and opportunities in the AA. The first contact is from a non-profit organization that promotes growth and development of existing businesses and pursues quality new businesses to help sustain the economic vitality of the area. The contact stated that the area banks, including FNB, stand out as agricultural, business, and home mortgage lenders in the community. The contact stated that the area weathered the Coronavirus pandemic rather well, especially due to the strong agricultural industry of the area. The other contact serves the insurance needs of a local community in the AA by providing insurance to farms, businesses, individuals, and families. This contact stated that most employers are ag-based and that most credit needs are related to the agricultural industry. Neither

contact had any concerns related to FNB's ability to serve the local communities and the borrowers within the AA.

Scope of Evaluation in Kansas

The Spearville AA in Kansas received a full-scope review. A limited scope review is not applicable as the bank only has one AA.

LENDING TEST

The bank's performance under the Lending Test in Kansas is rated Satisfactory.

Conclusions for Area Receiving a Full-Scope Review

Based on a full-scope review, the bank's performance in the Spearville AA is reasonable.

Distribution of Loans by Income Level of the Geography

The bank exhibits reasonable geographic distribution of loans in the AA. The only moderate-income tract in the AA has several competing banks serving the area, making it difficult for an institution the size of FNB to compete. FNB originates a similar amount of loans between middle- and upper-income tracts.

Small Loans to Farms

Refer to Table S in the state of Kansas section of Appendix D for the facts and data used to evaluate the geographic distribution of the bank's originations and purchases of small loans to farms.

Distribution of Loans by Income Level of the Borrower

The bank exhibits a reasonable distribution of loans to individuals of different income levels and businesses and farms of different sizes, given the product lines offered by the bank.

Small Loans to Farms

Responses to Complaints

FNB did not receive any written complaints related to its CRA performance during the evaluation period.

Appendix C: Definitions and Common Abbreviations

The following terms and abbreviations are used in this performance evaluation, including the CRA tables. The definitions are intended to provide the reader with a general understanding of the terms, not a strict legal definition.

Affiliate: Any company that controls, is controlled by, or is under common control with another company. A company is under common control with another company if the same company directly or indirectly controls both companies. For example, a bank subsidiary is controlled by the bank and is, therefore, an affiliate.

Aggregate Lending (Aggt.): The number of loans originated and purchased by all reporting lenders (HMDA or CRA) in specified income categories as a percentage of the aggregate number of loans originated and purchased by all reporting lenders in the state/assessment area.

Census Tract (CT): A small, relatively permanent statistical subdivision of a county delineated by a local committee of census data users for the purpose of presenting data. Census tracts nest within counties, and their boundaries normally follow visible features, but may follow legal geography boundaries and other non-visible features in some instances, Census tracts ideally contain about 4,000 people and 1,600 housing units.

Combined Statistical Area (CSA): A geographic entity consisting of two or more adjacent Core Based Statistical Areas with employment interchange measures of at least 15. An employment interchange measure is a measure of ties between two adjacent entities. The employment interchange measure is the sum of the percentage of workers living in the smaller entity who work in the larger entity and the percentage of employment in the smaller entity that is accounted for by workers who reside in the larger entity.

Community Development (CD): Affordable housing (including multifamily rental housing) for low- or moderate-income individuals; community services targeted to low- or moderate-income individuals; activities that promote economic development by financing businesses or farms that meet Small Business Administration Development Company or Small Business Investment Company programs size eligibility standards or have gross annual revenues of \$1 million or less; or activities that revitalize or stabilize low- or moderate-income geographies, distressed or underserved nonmetropolitan middle-income geographies, or designated disaster areas.

Community Reinvestment Act (CRA): The statute that requires the OCC to evaluate a bank's record of meeting the credit needs of its entire community, including LMI areas, consistent with the safe and sound operation of the bank, and to take this record into account when evaluating certain corporate applications filed by the bank.

Consumer Loan(s): A loan(s) to one or more individuals for household, family, or other personal expenditures. A consumer loan does not include a home mortgage, small business, or small farm loan. This definition includes the following categories: motor vehicle loans, credit card loans, other secured consumer loans, and other unsecured consumer loans.

Family: Includes a householder and one or more other persons living in the same household who are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. The number of family households always equals the number of families; however, a family household may also include non-relatives living with the family. Families are classified by type as either a married-couple family or other family, which is further classified into 'male householder' (a family with a male householder' and no wife present) or 'female householder' (a family with a female householder and no husband present).

Full-Scope Review: Performance under the Lending, Investment, and Service Tests is analyzed considering performance context, quantitative factors (e.g., geographic distribution, borrower distribution, and total number and dollar amount of investments), and qualitative factors (e.g., innovativeness, complexity, and responsiveness).

Geography: A census tract delineated by the United States Bureau of the Census in the most recent decennial census.

Home Mortgage Disclosure Act (HMDA): The statute that requires certain mortgage lenders that conduct business or have banking offices in a metropolitan statistical area to file annual summary reports of their mortgage lending activity. The reports include such data as the race, gender, and the income of applicants, the amount of loan requested, the disposition of the application (e.g., approved, denied, and withdrawn), the lien status of the collateral, any requests for preapproval, and loans for manufactured housing.

Home Mortgage Loans: A closed-end mortgage loan or an open-end line of credit as these terms are defined under 12 CFR 1003.2, and that is not an excluded transaction under 12 CFR 1003.3(c)(1) through (c)(10) and (c)(13).

Household: Includes all persons occupying a housing unit. Persons not living in households are classified as living in group quarters. In 100 percent tabulations, the count of households always equals the count of occupied housing units.

Limited-Scope Review: Performance under the Lending, Investment, and Service Tests is analyzed using only quantitative factors (e.g., geographic distribution, borrower distribution, total number and dollar amount of investments, and branch distribution).

Low-Income Individual: Individual income that is less than 50 percent of the area median income.

Low Income Geography: A census tract with a median family income that is less than 50 percent.

Market Share: The number of loans originated and purchased by the institution as a percentage of the aggregate number of loans originated and purchased by all reporting lenders in the state/assessment area.

Median Family Income (MFI): The median income determined by the U.S. Census Bureau every five years and used to determine the income level category of geographies. The median is the point at which half of the families have income above, and half below, a range of incomes. Also, the median income determined by the Federal Financial Institutions Examination Council (FFIEC) annually that is used to determine the income level category of individuals. For any given area, the median is the point at which half of the families have income above, and half below, a range of incomes.

Metropolitan Division: As defined by Office of Management and Budget, a county or group of counties within a Core Based Statistical Area that contains an urbanized population of at least 2.5 million. A Metropolitan Division consists of one or more main/secondary counties that represent an employment center or centers, plus adjacent counties associated with the main/secondary county or counties through commuting ties.

Metropolitan Statistical Area: An area, defined by the Office of Management and Budget, as a core based statistical area associated with at least one urbanized area that has a population of at least 50,000. The Metropolitan Statistical Area comprises the central county or counties containing the core, plus adjacent outlying counties having a high degree of social and economic integration with the central county or counties as measured through commuting.

Middle-Income: Individual income that is at least 80 percent and less than 120 percent of the area median income, or a median family income that is at least 80 percent and less than 120 percent, in the case of a geography

Moderate-Income: Individual income that is at least 50 percent and less than 80 percent of the area median income, or a median family income that is at least 50 percent and less than 80 percent, in the case of a geography.

Multifamily: Refers to a residential structure that contains five or more units.

Owner-Occupied Units: Includes units occupied by the owner or co-owner, even if the unit has not been fully paid for or is mortgaged.

Qualified Investment: A qualified investment is defined as any lawful investment, deposit, membership share, or grant that has as its primary purpose community development.

Rating Area: A rated area is a state or multi-state metropolitan statistical area. For an institution with domestic branches in only one state, the institution's CRA rating would be the state rating. If an institution maintains domestic branches in more than one state, the institution will receive a rating for each state in which those branches are located. If an institution maintains domestic branches in two or more states within a multi-state metropolitan statistical area, the institution will receive a rating for the multi-state metropolitan statistical area.

Small Loan(s) to Business(es): A loan included in 'loans to small businesses' as defined in the Consolidated Report of Condition and Income (Call Report) instructions. These loans have original amounts of \$1 million or less and typically are either secured by nonfarm or nonresidential real estate or are classified as commercial and industrial loans.

Small Loan(s) to Farm(s): A loan included in 'loans to small farms' as defined in the instructions for preparation of the Consolidated Report of Condition and Income (Call Report). These loans have original amounts of \$500,000 or less and are either secured by farmland, or are classified as loans to finance agricultural production and other loans to farmers.

Tier 1 Capital: The total of common shareholders' equity, perpetual preferred shareholders' equity with non-cumulative dividends, retained earnings and minority interests in the equity accounts of consolidated subsidiaries.

Upper-Income: Individual income that is at least 120 percent of the area median income, or a median family income that is at least 120 percent, in the case of a geography.
