Overall CRA Rating

Institution's CRA Rating: This institution is rated Satisfactory.

The lending test is rated: Satisfactory.

The major factors that support this rating include:

- The loan-to-deposit (LTD) ratio is reasonable given the bank's size, financial condition, and the credit needs of its assessment area (AA).
- A substantial majority of loan originations are made within the bank's AA.
- The borrower distribution of home mortgage and consumer loans reflects reasonable distribution among borrowers of different income levels.
- The geographic distribution of home mortgage and consumer loans reflects reasonable distribution among geographies.

Loan-to-Deposit Ratio

Considering the bank's size, financial condition, and credit needs of the AA, the bank's LTD is reasonable.

The bank's quarterly LTD ratio averaged 52.59 percent over the 17 quarters from March 31, 2016 to March 31, 2020. The bank ranks second in a peer group that includes three other similarly situated banks with peer bank average LTD ratios ranging from 43.84 percent to 75.95 percent during the specified period. The other banks in this peer group have total assets ranging from \$65 million to \$327 million.

Lending in Assessment Area

A substantial majority of the bank's loans are inside its AA.

The bank originated or purchased 95.00 percent of its total loans by number and 96.98 percent of its total loans by dollar amount inside the bank's AA during the evaluation period. This analysis is performed at the bank level, rather than the AA level. This percentage does not include extensions of credit by affiliates that may be considered under the other performance criteria. See the chart below for additional detail.

Scope of the Evaluation

Evaluation Period/Products Evaluated

We evaluated First National Bank in Tigerton's (FNB Tigerton's) performance under the Small Bank Lending Test. The Lending Test assesses the bank's record of meeting the credit needs of its AA through lending activities. We reviewed data for the bank's primary loan products, including home mortgage loans and consumer loans, to evaluate the bank's lending performance.

This evaluation covers the period since the prior CRA examination, March 28, 2016, through July 6, 2020. The Lending Test evaluated loans originated between January 1, 2017 and December 31, 2019.

To provide more current and accurate demographic data, the federal banking agencies are now updating census data every five years instead of 10, beginning with the Census Bureau's 2015 American Community Survey (ACS). FNB Tigerton's AA was not impacted by this change; therefore, we combined our assessment for 2017, 2018, and 2019. Data is discussed in the applicable narrative sections of the evaluation.

To evaluate lending, we used data from bank reports and a random sample of home mortgage and consumer loans originated in the bank's AA. Our lending analysis utilized the most recent available demographic and aggregate peer lending data.

Discriminatory or Other Illegal Credit Practices Review

Pursuant to 12 CFR 25.28(c) or 195.28(c), respectively, in determining a national bank's or federal savings association's (collectively, bank) CRA rating, the OCC considers evidence of discriminatory or other illegal credit practices in any geography by the bank, or in any AA by an affiliate whose loans have been considered as part of the bank's lending performance. As part of this evaluation process, the OCC consults with other federal agencies with responsibility for compliance with the relevant laws and regulations, including the U.S. Department of Justice, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the Bureau of Consumer Financial Protection, as applicable.

The OCC has not identified that this institution (or any affiliate whose loans have been considered as part of the institution's lending performance) has engaged in discriminatory or other illegal credit practices that require consideration in this evaluation.

The OCC will consider any information that this institution engaged in discriminatory or other illegal credit practices, identified by or provided to the OCC before the end of the institution's next performance evaluation in that subsequent evaluation, even if the information concerns activities that occurred during the evaluation period addressed in this performance evaluation.

State Rating

State of Wisconsin

CRA rating for the State of Wisconsin¹: Satisfactory.

The Lending Test is rated: Satisfactory.

The major factors that support this rating include:

- The LTD ratio is reasonable given the bank's size, financial condition, and the credit needs of its AA.
- A substantial majority of loan originations are made within the institution's AA.
- The borrower distribution of home mortgage loans and consumer loans reflects reasonable distribution among borrowers of different income levels.
- The borrower distribution of home mortgage loans and consumer loans reflects reasonable distribution among geographies.

Description of Institution's Operations in Wisconsin

FNB Tigerton is a \$24 million federally chartered bank with its main office located in Tigerton, Wisconsin. The bank is wholly owned by Tigerton Bancorporation Inc., a one bank holding company. The bank consists of the main office in Tigerton with one ATM and a branch in Bowler, WI.

The bank's business strategy is to serve the credit and depository needs of their local community. The bank offers a variety of traditional products and services including commercial, real estate, and consumer loans and various deposit and financial products. As of March 31, 2020, the loan portfolio represented 42.04 percent of total assets. The composition of the loan portfolio by dollar volume consists of residential real estate loans (70.49 percent), commercial loans (13.65 percent), agricultural loans (10.81 percent), and consumer loans (5.04 percent).

FNB Tigerton has one AA and one rating area. The AA is contiguous and does not lie within a metropolitan statistical area (MSA). The AA is a non-MSA AA, covering four census tracts (CTs) located in Wisconsin. There are no CTs listed as distressed or underserved. FNB Tigerton's main branch

is located in a middle-income CT, and the Bowler branch is in a moderate-income CT. Our assessment was based solely on lending within the state of Wisconsin given the bank does not have any branches in any other states. There are no legal or financial impediments limiting the bank's ability to meet the credit needs of the AA. FNB Tigerton's last CRA evaluation was dated March 28, 2016, using Small Bank procedures. The bank received a Satisfactory rating.

Employment and Economic Factors

Major employers in the AA include manufacturers in paper making products, textiles, wood products, iron works, agriculture, and food processing. Some of the major employers in the area are Tigerton Lumber Company and the Tigerton School District. During the review period, unemployment in the bank's AA was in line with statewide unemployment data. The onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 has impacted local, state, and US economies, which can now be characterized as generally unstable.

Until the recent pandemic, the unemployment level in Shawano County remained stable and in line with the state average from 2017 to 2019, but a significant increase occurred in early 2020. In April 2020 unemployment increased to 13.8 percent in Shawano county, and 13.6 percent in the state of Wisconsin, increasing the yearly average to 6.7 percent and 6.3 percent respectively. Please refer to the chart below for the average unemployment rate for Shawano county and the state of Wisconsin, for the years 2017, 2018, 2019, and first four months of 2020.

Market competition is strong in the bank's AA. As of June 30, 2019, FNB Tigerton had 4.13 percent of the deposit market share, placing the bank seventh out of nine financial institutions in the AA. Competing financial institutions had deposit market shares ranging from 1.27 percent (Denmark State Bank) to 38.66 percent (Associated Bank, National Association) during the same period.

Community Contact

We spoke with a community contact that is involved at both the Tigerton Main Street Inc. and the Village of Tigerton. The contact noted that the local economy was doing well during our review period, particularly tourism at the RV and ATV Parks. Despite being such a small community, the Village of Tigerton is still able to maintain their own school district, a clinic, and several locally owned businesses, though the community does face challenges given its rural location and low population. The community contact noted that FNB Tigerton is very involved in supporting the needs of the community, and several bank employees are active on different committees within the community. Overall, the needs of the community are being met by the local financial institutions.

According to 2015 ACS Census Data, the bank's AA is comprised of 4 CTs, of which zero are lowincome, one (25.0 percent) is moderate-income, three (75.0 percent) are middle-income, and zero are upper-income. The AA includes only the western half of Shawano County, WI. Given the bank's asset size, available resources, and limited branch locations, the designation of the entire Shawano County would be too large for the bank to reasonably serve. The AA does not arbitrarily exclude any low- or moderate-income geographies. The total population of the AA is 16,390, which is comprised of 4,418 families. The percentage of families at each income level is: 22.0 percent low-income, 21.4 percent moderate-income, 23.4 percent middle-income, and 33.3 percent upper-income. The average median family income is \$60,742. The percentage of families below the poverty level is 9.6 percent. Owneroccupied units comprise 63.8 percent of total housing units.

LENDING TEST

The bank's performance under the Lending Test in Wisconsin is rated Satisfactory.

Conclusions for Area Receiving a Full-Scope Review

Based on a full-scope review, the bank's performance in the Wisconsin non-MSA AA is reasonable.

Distribution of Loans by Income Level of the Geography

The bank exhibits reasonable geographic distribution of loans in the AA.

The geographic distribution of home mortgage and consumer loans reflects reasonable distribution among geographies.

Home Mortgage Loans

Refer to table O in appendix D for the facts and data used to evaluate the geographic distribution of the bank's home mortgage loan originations and purchases.

2017-2019 Conclusions

The geographic distribution of home mortgage loans reflects reasonable distribution among geographies. There are no low-income CTs in the bank's AA. Based on our random sample, the bank originated 15.2 percent of home mortgage loans in moderate-income geographies. This percentage of the loans originated by the bank is less than the 25.1 percent of owner-occupied housing units in moderate-income geographies. The percentage of bank loans is less than the aggregate peer lending data, which shows 18.9 percent of peer home mortgages lending was in moderate-income geographies.

Consumer Loans

Refer to table U in appendix D for the facts and data used to evaluate the geographic distribution of the bank's consumer loan originations and purchases.

2017-2019 Conclusions

The geographic distribution of consumer loans reflects reasonable distribution among geographies. There are no low-income CTs in the bank's AA. Based on our random sample, the bank originated 12.5 percent of loans in moderate-income geographies. The percentage of the bank's originated loans is less than the percentage of households in the moderate-income geographies of 26.0 percent.

Distribution of Loans by Income Level of the Borrower

The bank exhibits a reasonable distribution of loans to individuals of different income levels, given the product lines offered by the bank.

Home Mortgage Loans

Refer to table P in appendix D for the facts and data used to evaluate the borrower distribution of the bank's consumer loan originations and purchases.

2017-2019 Conclusions

The borrower distribution of home mortgages within the AA reflects reasonable distribution among borrowers of different incomes. The bank originated 9.1 percent of its home mortgages to low-income families, which is above the aggregate of 7.1 percent. There are 22.0 percent of families in the low-income CTs. The bank originated 21.2 percent of loans to moderate-income families, which is below the aggregate of 24.9 percent. There are 21.4 percent of families in the moderate-income CTs.

Consumer Loans

Refer to table V in appendix D for the facts and data used to evaluate the borrower distribution of the bank's consumer loan originations and purchases.

2017-2019 Conclusions

The borrower distribution of consumer loans within the AA reflects reasonable distribution among borrowers of different incomes. Based on our random sample, the bank originated 58.3 percent of loans in the AA to low-income borrowers, which is above the 25.1 percent of households in AA that are low-income. The bank originated 20.8 percent of loans in the AA to moderate-income borrowers, which is above the 17.5 percent of households in the AA that are moderate-income.

Responses to Complaints

There were no consumer complaints regarding the bank's CRA performance, nor any indicating illegal or discriminatory lending practice within this evaluation period.

Appendix C: Definitions and Common Abbreviations

The following terms and abbreviations are used in this performance evaluation, including the CRA tables. The definitions are intended to provide the reader with a general understanding of the terms, not a strict legal definition.

Affiliate: Any company that controls, is controlled by, or is under common control with another company. A company is under common control with another company if the same company directly or indirectly controls both companies. For example, a bank subsidiary is controlled by the bank and is, therefore, an affiliate.

Aggregate Lending (Aggt.): The number of loans originated and purchased by all reporting lenders (HMDA or CRA) in specified income categories as a percentage of the aggregate number of loans originated and purchased by all reporting lenders in the state/assessment area.

Census Tract (CT): A small, relatively permanent statistical subdivision of a county delineated by a local committee of census data users for the purpose of presenting data. Census tracts nest within counties, and their boundaries normally follow visible features, but may follow legal geography boundaries and other non-visible features in some instances, Census tracts ideally contain about 4,000 people and 1,600 housing units.

Combined Statistical Area (CSA): A geographic entity consisting of two or more adjacent Core Based Statistical Areas with employment interchange measures of at least 15. An employment interchange measure is a measure of ties between two adjacent entities. The employment interchange measure is the sum of the percentage of workers living in the smaller entity who work in the larger entity and the percentage of employment in the smaller entity that is accounted for by workers who reside in the larger entity.

Community Development (CD): Affordable housing (including multifamily rental housing) for low- or moderate-income individuals; community services targeted to low- or moderate-income individuals; activities that promote economic development by financing businesses or farms that meet Small Business Administration Development Company or Small Business Investment Company programs size eligibility standards or have gross annual revenues of \$1 million or less; or activities that revitalize or stabilize low- or moderate-income geographies, distressed or underserved nonmetropolitan middle-income geographies, or designated disaster areas.

Community Reinvestment Act (CRA): The statute that requires the OCC to evaluate a bank's record of meeting the credit needs of its entire community, including LMI areas, consistent with the safe and sound operation of the bank, and to take this record into account when evaluating certain corporate applications filed by the bank.

Consumer Loan(s): A loan(s) to one or more individuals for household, family, or other personal expenditures. A consumer loan does not include a home mortgage, small business, or small farm loan. This definition includes the following categories: motor vehicle loans, credit card loans, other secured consumer loans, and other unsecured consumer loans.

Family: Includes a householder and one or more other persons living in the same household who are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. The number of family households always equals the number of families; however, a family household may also include non-relatives living with the family. Families are classified by type as either a married-couple family or other family, which is further classified into 'male householder' (a family with a male householder' and no wife present) or 'female householder' (a family with a female householder and no husband present).

Full-Scope Review: Performance under the Lending, Investment, and Service Tests is analyzed considering performance context, quantitative factors (e.g., geographic distribution, borrower distribution, and total number and dollar amount of investments), and qualitative factors (e.g., innovativeness, complexity, and responsiveness).

Geography: A census tract delineated by the United States Bureau of the Census in the most recent decennial census.

Home Mortgage Disclosure Act (HMDA): The statute that requires certain mortgage lenders that conduct business or have banking offices in a metropolitan statistical area to file annual summary reports of their mortgage lending activity. The reports include such data as the race, gender, and the income of applicants, the amount of loan requested, the disposition of the application (e.g., approved, denied, and withdrawn), the lien status of the collateral, any requests for preapproval, and loans for manufactured housing.

Home Mortgage Loans: A closed-end mortgage loan or an open-end line of credit as these terms are defined under 12 CFR 1003.2, and that is not an excluded transaction under 12 CFR 1003.3(c)(1) through (c)(10) and (c)(13).

Household: Includes all persons occupying a housing unit. Persons not living in households are classified as living in group quarters. In 100 percent tabulations, the count of households always equals the count of occupied housing units.

Limited-Scope Review: Performance under the Lending, Investment, and Service Tests is analyzed using only quantitative factors (e.g., geographic distribution, borrower distribution, total number and dollar amount of investments, and branch distribution).

Low-Income Individual: Individual income that is less than 50 percent of the area median income.

Low Income Geography: A census tract with a median family income that is less than 50 percent.

Market Share: The number of loans originated and purchased by the institution as a percentage of the aggregate number of loans originated and purchased by all reporting lenders in the state/assessment area.

Median Family Income (MFI): The median income determined by the U.S. Census Bureau every five years and used to determine the income level category of geographies. The median is the point at which half of the families have income above, and half below, a range of incomes. Also, the median income determined by the Federal Financial Institutions Examination Council (FFIEC) annually that is used to determine the income level category of individuals. For any given area, the median is the point at which half of the families have income above, and half below, a range of incomes.

Metropolitan Division: As defined by Office of Management and Budget, a county or group of counties within a Core Based Statistical Area that contains an urbanized population of at least 2.5 million. A Metropolitan Division consists of one or more main/secondary counties that represent an employment center or centers, plus adjacent counties associated with the main/secondary county or counties through commuting ties.

Metropolitan Statistical Area: An area, defined by the Office of Management and Budget, as a core based statistical area associated with at least one urbanized area that has a population of at least 50,000. The Metropolitan Statistical Area comprises the central county or counties containing the core, plus adjacent outlying counties having a high degree of social and economic integration with the central county or counties as measured through commuting.

Middle-Income: Individual income that is at least 80 percent and less than 120 percent of the area median income, or a median family income that is at least 80 percent and less than 120 percent, in the case of a geography

Moderate-Income: Individual income that is at least 50 percent and less than 80 percent of the area median income, or a median family income that is at least 50 percent and less than 80 percent, in the case of a geography.

Multifamily: Refers to a residential structure that contains five or more units.

Owner-Occupied Units: Includes units occupied by the owner or co-owner, even if the unit has not been fully paid for or is mortgaged.

Qualified Investment: A qualified investment is defined as any lawful investment, deposit, membership share, or grant that has as its primary purpose community development.

Rating Area: A rated area is a state or multi-state metropolitan statistical area. For an institution with domestic branches in only one state, the institution's CRA rating would be the state rating. If an institution maintains domestic branches in more than one state, the institution will receive a rating for each state in which those branches are located. If an institution maintains domestic branches in two or more states within a multi-state metropolitan statistical area, the institution will receive a rating for the multi-state metropolitan statistical area.

Small Loan(s) to Business(es): A loan included in 'loans to small businesses' as defined in the Consolidated Report of Condition and Income (Call Report) instructions. These loans have original amounts of \$1 million or less and typically are either secured by nonfarm or nonresidential real estate or are classified as commercial and industrial loans.

Small Loan(s) to Farm(s): A loan included in 'loans to small farms' as defined in the instructions for preparation of the Consolidated Report of Condition and Income (Call Report). These loans have original amounts of \$500,000 or less and are either secured by farmland, or are classified as loans to finance agricultural production and other loans to farmers.

Tier 1 Capital: The total of common shareholders' equity, perpetual preferred shareholders' equity with non-cumulative dividends, retained earnings and minority interests in the equity accounts of consolidated subsidiaries.

Upper-Income: Individual income that is at least 120 percent of the area median income, or a median family income that is at least 120 percent, in the case of a geography.

Content of Standardized Tables

A separate set of tables is provided for each state. All multistate metropolitan statistical areas, if applicable, are presented in one set of tables. References to the "bank" include activities of any affiliates that the bank provided for consideration (refer to appendix A: Scope of the Examination). For purposes of reviewing the Lending Test tables, the following are applicable: (1) purchased are treated as originations; and (2) "aggregate" is the percentage of the aggregate number of reportable loans originated and purchased by all HMDA or CRA-reporting lenders in the MMSA/assessment area. Deposit data are compiled by the FDIC and are available as of June 30th of each year. Tables without data are not included in this PE.
