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Overall CRA Rating

Institution's CRA Rating: This institution is rated Satisfactory.

The lending test is rated: Satisfactory.

The major factors that support this rating include:

- The bank demonstrates a reasonable quarterly average net loan-to-deposit ratio during the evaluation period given substantial deposit growth of the institution and economic circumstances within the assessment area (AA).
- A majority of loans sampled were originated to borrowers located in the bank's AA.
- Lending to individuals of various income levels and businesses of different sizes is excellent.

Loan-to-Deposit Ratio

Considering the bank's size, financial condition, and credit needs of the AA(s), the bank's loan-to-deposit ratio is reasonable.

The First National Bank of Aspermont's (FNB's) loan-to-deposit (LTD) ratio is reasonable given their capacity to lend and consideration of demographic and economic data from the assessment area. FNB's average quarterly LTD ratio from June 30, 2019, to December 31, 2022, was 27.2 percent. Similarly situated institutions with total assets under \$100 million and located in rural areas had an average quarterly loan-to-deposit ratio of 37.9 percent with a high average rate of 55.8 and low average rate of 18.4 percent. FNB's loan to deposit ratio suffered compression over the evaluation period as deposit growth far outpaced loan growth. Over the evaluation period, net loan and leases grew 58 percent while deposits over the same period grew 111 percent.

Lending in Assessment Area

A majority of the bank's loans are made to borrowers inside its assessment area(s) (AAs).

The bank originated and purchased 66.7 percent of its total loans by number and 58.10 percent by dollar inside the bank's AA during the evaluation period. This analysis is performed at the bank, rather than the AA, level. This percentage does not include extensions of credit by affiliates that may be considered under the other performance criteria.

Description of Institution

FNB has designated Stonewall County as its assessment area (AA). Stonewall County is located 60 miles northwest of Abilene, TX and 100 miles southeast of Lubbock, TX. The bank is wholly owned by Aspermont Bankshares, Inc., a one-bank holding company. The bank has a branch in Hamlin, TX and a loan production office in Lubbock, TX. The bank offers loans, checking accounts, certificates of deposit, cashier's checks, and other services. The bank provides customers 24-hour access to banking services through its website at www.fnbaspermont.com and basic mobile banking. Internet baking services include account balance inquiries, funds transfers, and bill pay. Aspermont is the largest city in Stonewall County and is also the county seat. The bank's AA is comprised of one census tract that is designated middle-income. As such, there are no low-, moderate-, or upper-income census tracts in the AA. The area meets the requirements of the regulation and does not arbitrarily exclude low- and moderate-income (LMI) geographies. Demographic information in the AA shows that 20.7 percent of the families in the AA are considered low-income and 12.5 percent of families are moderate-income. The unemployment rate is 3.89 percent, and 13.8 percent of households are below the poverty level as of the 2015 census. The median family income is \$52,198.

There are no other financial institutions in the AA. Accordingly, FNB has a 100 percent market share of deposits in the AA. The local economy is primarily agriculture; however, the City of Aspermont is located on the edge of the Cline Shale. The bank's risk exposure to the oil and gas industry is minimal. With the openings of the Hamlin, TX branch and loan production office in Lubbock, TX, the bank has experienced moderate loan growth and a marginal shift in loan portfolio mix.

Scope of the Evaluation

Evaluation Period/Products Evaluated

The CRA evaluation period is January 1, 2019, through December 31, 2021. The year 2022 was not included in the scope of this evaluation. Peer data was not available for 2022 at the time of this report; thus, no meaningful analysis could be completed. The OCC evaluated FNB using small bank CRA performance standards that include five performance criteria: the LTD ratio, lending in the AA, lending to borrowers of different incomes and businesses of different sizes, geographic distribution of loans, and responsiveness to CRA complaints. To evaluate the bank's lending performance, the OCC selected a random sample of loans originated during the evaluation period based on identified primary products in

the bank's AA. Primary loan types are those products originated at the highest percentage by number and/or dollar volume of loans and business strategy. During this evaluation period, primary products consisted of consumer and agricultural loans.

Selection of Areas for Full-Scope Review

In each state where the bank has an office, one or more of AAs within that state was selected for a full-scope review. For purposes of this evaluation, bank delineated assessment areas located within the same metropolitan statistical area (MSA), multistate metropolitan statistical area (MMSA), or combined statistical area (CSA) are combined and evaluated as a single AA. Similarly, bank delineated non-MSA AAs within the same state are combined and evaluated as a single area. These combined AAs may be evaluated as full- or limited-scope. Refer to the "Scope" section under each State Rating for details regarding how full-scope AAs were selected. Refer to appendix A, Scope of Examination, for a list of full- and limited-scope AAs.

Ratings

The bank's overall rating is a blend of the state ratings, and where applicable, multistate ratings. FNB has only one rating area, which is the State of Texas. The bank's overall rating is based on a full-scope review of the Stonewall County assessment area. The MMSA rating and state ratings are based on performance in all bank AAs. Refer to the "Scope" section under each state and MMSA Rating section for details regarding how the areas were weighted in arriving at the respective ratings.

Discriminatory or Other Illegal Credit Practices Review

Pursuant to 12 CFR 25.28(c) or 195.28(c), respectively, in determining a national bank's or federal savings association's (collectively, bank) CRA rating, the OCC considers evidence of discriminatory or other illegal credit practices in any geography by the bank, or in any AA by an affiliate whose loans have been considered as part of the bank's lending performance. As part of this evaluation process, the OCC consults with other federal agencies with responsibility for compliance with the relevant laws and regulations, including the U.S. Department of Justice, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the Bureau of Consumer Financial Protection, as applicable.

The OCC has not identified that this institution (or any affiliate whose loans have been considered as part of the institution's lending performance) has engaged in discriminatory or other illegal credit practices that require consideration in this evaluation.

State of Texas

CRA rating for the State of Texas: Satisfactory

The Lending Test is rated: Satisfactory

The major factors that support this rating include:

- The bank demonstrates a reasonable quarterly average net loan-to-deposit ratio during the evaluation period given substantial deposit growth of the institution and economic circumstances within the assessment area (AA).
- A majority of loans sampled were originated to borrowers located in the bank's AA.
- Lending to individuals of various income levels and businesses of different sizes is excellent.

Description of Institution's Operations in Texas

The First National Bank of Aspermont (FNB) is a \$108 million community bank headquartered in Aspermont, TX, 60 miles northwest of Abilene, TX. The bank consists of the main branch in Aspermont, a branch in Hamlin, TX, and a loan production office in Lubbock, TX. The bank is wholly owned by Aspermont Bankshares, Inc., a one-bank holding company. FNB offers a full range of traditional commercial and consumer loans, banking products, and other financial services. Bank lobby services are provided Monday through Friday from 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The bank offers loans, checking accounts, certificates of deposit, cashier's checks, and other services. The bank provides customers 24-hour access to banking services through its website at www.fnbaspermont.com and basic mobile banking. Internet baking services include account balance inquiries, funds transfers, and bill pay. The local economy is primarily agriculture; however, the City of Aspermont is located on the edge of the Cline Shale. FNB is the only financial institution located in the assessment area. As such, FNB has a 100 percent market share of deposits. FNB's business strategy is to serve agricultural, commercial, and retail customers in Stonewall County. No legal impediments or other factors hinder FNB's ability to provide credit in its AA. The bank is financially capable of meeting almost any request for credit, subject to certain legal restrictions applicable to all national banks. As of December 31, 2021, net loans and leases totaled \$22 million and comprised 19 percent of total assets and 21 percent of total deposits.

We contacted community organizations within each AA to develop community profiles, identify community development opportunities, and measure participation by local financial institutions.

Stonewall County AA

FNB has designated Stonewall County as its assessment area (AA). Stonewall County is located 60 miles northwest of Abilene, TX and 100 miles southeast of Lubbock, TX. The bank has a branch in Hamlin, TX and a loan production office in Lubbock, TX. Aspermont is the largest city in Stonewall County and is also the county seat. This area is small by population with 1,414 people in the geography.

The bank's AA is comprised of one census tract that is designated middle-income. As such, there are no low-, moderate-, or upper-income census tracts located in the AA. The area meets the requirements of the regulation and does not arbitrarily exclude low- and moderate-income (LMI) geographies. Demographic information in the AA shows that 20.7 percent of the families in the AA are considered low-income and 12.5 percent of families are moderate-income. The unemployment rate is 3.89 percent, and 13.8 percent of households are below the poverty level as of the 2015 census. The median family income is \$52,198.

There are no other financial institutions in the AA. Accordingly, FNB has a 100 percent market share of deposits in the AA. The local economy is primarily agriculture; however, the City of Aspermont is located on the edge of the Cline Shale. The bank's risk exposure to the oil and gas industry is minimal. With the openings of the Hamlin, TX branch and loan production office in Lubbock, TX, the bank has experienced moderate loan growth and a marginal shift in loan portfolio mix.

The community contact for the AA noted that the economy was largely stable, but the population is declining. The local economy is tied heavily to the agricultural community, and to a lesser extent, the oil and gas industry. Active drilling sites in the AA are down, but downstream activities continue to comprise a large amount of the business and employment opportunities. The largest employer in the AA was noted to be Stonewall Memorial Hospital. Housing and loans to entrepreneurs were identified as the primary needs of the community. Our contact noted that FNB has a positive public perception and is regularly involved in community development activities.

Scope of Evaluation in Texas

The institution has designated Stonewall County as its AA. The AA received a full-scope review. Refer to the tables in appendix A for a list of all AAs under review. Consistent with the institution's primary lending focus, consumer and agricultural business loans were analyzed.

Lending Test

The bank's performance under the Lending Test in Texas is rated Satisfactory.

Conclusions for Area Receiving a Full-Scope Review

Based on a full-scope review, the bank's performance in the Stonewall County AA is good.

Distribution of Loans by Income Level of the Geography

The institution's AA contains one census tract that is designated middle-income. As such, there are no low-to-moderate income census tracts in the AA and an analysis of the geographic distribution of loans would not be meaningful and therefore was not performed.

Distribution of Loans by Income Level of the Borrower

The bank exhibits an excellent distribution of loans to individuals of different income levels and farms of different sizes, given the product lines offered by the bank.

Small Loans to Farms

Refer to Table T in the State of Texas section of appendix D for the facts and data used to evaluate the borrower distribution of the bank's originations and purchases of small loans to farms.

The distribution of loans to small farms is excellent. Of the thirty agricultural loans sampled, FNB originated twenty, or 66.7 percent, of those loans within their assessment area. Lending to small farms with revenues less than \$1 million was slightly lower than the percentage of farms that report revenues less than \$1 million and significantly exceeded the aggregate lending to those farms. Three of the loans originated in the AA had no revenue information that was reported (15%). While loans to farms with revenue less than \$1 million is marginally below the AA demographic, a review of the agricultural loan sample noted that loans to farms with revenue not available were small dollar loans.

Consumer Loans

Refer to Table V in the State of Texas section of appendix D for the facts and data used to evaluate the borrower distribution of the bank's consumer loan originations and purchases.

The distribution of loans to individuals of different incomes is excellent. Of the thirty consumer loans sampled, FNB originated twenty, or 66.7 percent, of those loans within their assessment area. Of those twenty loans, seven (35%) were originated to low-income borrowers. Nine loans (45%) were originated to moderate-income borrowers. The percentage of bank-originated consumer loans to low-and

moderate-income borrowers greatly exceeded the demographic distribution of low- and moderate-income borrowers.

Responses to Complaints

The bank did not receive any CRA-related complaints during the performance evaluation period.

Appendix C: Definitions and Common Abbreviations

The following terms and abbreviations are used in this performance evaluation, including the CRA tables. The definitions are intended to provide the reader with a general understanding of the terms, not a strict legal definition.

Affiliate: Any company that controls, is controlled by, or is under common control with another company. A company is under common control with another company if the same company directly or indirectly controls both companies. For example, a bank subsidiary is controlled by the bank and is, therefore, an affiliate.

Aggregate Lending (Aggt.): The number of loans originated and purchased by all reporting lenders (HMDA or CRA) in specified income categories as a percentage of the aggregate number of loans originated and purchased by all reporting lenders in the state/assessment area.

Census Tract (CT): A small, relatively permanent statistical subdivision of a county delineated by a local committee of census data users for the purpose of presenting data. Census tracts nest within counties, and their boundaries normally follow visible features, but may follow legal geography boundaries and other non-visible features in some instances, Census tracts ideally contain about 4,000 people and 1,600 housing units.

Combined Statistical Area (CSA): A geographic entity consisting of two or more adjacent Core Based Statistical Areas with employment interchange measures of at least 15. An employment interchange measure is a measure of ties between two adjacent entities. The employment interchange measure is the sum of the percentage of workers living in the smaller entity who work in the larger entity and the percentage of employment in the smaller entity that is accounted for by workers who reside in the larger entity.

Community Development (CD): Affordable housing (including multifamily rental housing) for low- or moderate-income individuals; community services targeted to low- or moderate-income individuals; activities that promote economic development by financing businesses or farms that meet Small Business Administration Development Company or Small Business Investment Company programs size eligibility standards or have gross annual revenues of \$1 million or less; or activities that revitalize or stabilize low- or moderate-income geographies, distressed or underserved nonmetropolitan middle-income geographies, or designated disaster areas.

Community Reinvestment Act (CRA): The statute that requires the OCC to evaluate a bank's record of meeting the credit needs of its entire community, including LMI areas, consistent with the safe and sound operation of the bank, and to take this record into account when evaluating certain corporate applications filed by the bank.

Consumer Loan(s): A loan(s) to one or more individuals for household, family, or other personal expenditures. A consumer loan does not include a home mortgage, small business, or small farm loan. This definition includes the following categories: motor vehicle loans, credit card loans, other secured consumer loans, and other unsecured consumer loans.

Family: Includes a householder and one or more other persons living in the same household who are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. The number of family households always equals the number of families; however, a family household may also include non-relatives living with the family. Families are classified by type as either a married-couple family or other family, which is further classified into 'male householder' (a family with a male householder' and no wife present) or 'female householder' (a family with a female householder and no husband present).

Full-Scope Review: Performance under the Lending, Investment, and Service Tests is analyzed considering performance context, quantitative factors (e.g., geographic distribution, borrower distribution, and total number and dollar amount of investments), and qualitative factors (e.g., innovativeness, complexity, and responsiveness).

Geography: A census tract delineated by the United States Bureau of the Census in the most recent decennial census.

Home Mortgage Disclosure Act (HMDA): The statute that requires certain mortgage lenders that conduct business or have banking offices in a metropolitan statistical area to file annual summary reports of their mortgage lending activity. The reports include such data as the race, gender, and the income of applicants, the amount of loan requested, the disposition of the application (e.g., approved, denied, and withdrawn), the lien status of the collateral, any requests for preapproval, and loans for manufactured housing.

Home Mortgage Loans: A closed-end mortgage loan or an open-end line of credit as these terms are defined under 12 CFR 1003.2, and that is not an excluded transaction under 12 CFR 1003.3(c)(1) through (c)(10) and (c)(13).

Household: Includes all persons occupying a housing unit. Persons not living in households are classified as living in group quarters. In 100 percent tabulations, the count of households always equals the count of occupied housing units.

Limited-Scope Review: Performance under the Lending, Investment, and Service Tests is analyzed using only quantitative factors (e.g., geographic distribution, borrower distribution, total number and dollar amount of investments, and branch distribution).

Low-Income Individual: Individual income that is less than 50 percent of the area median income.

Low Income Geography: A census tract with a median family income that is less than 50 percent.

Market Share: The number of loans originated and purchased by the institution as a percentage of the aggregate number of loans originated and purchased by all reporting lenders in the state/assessment area.

Median Family Income (MFI): The median income determined by the U.S. Census Bureau every five years and used to determine the income level category of geographies. The median is the point at which half of the families have income above, and half below, a range of incomes. Also, the median income determined by the Federal Financial Institutions Examination Council (FFIEC) annually that is used to determine the income level category of individuals. For any given area, the median is the point at which half of the families have income above, and half below, a range of incomes.

Metropolitan Division: As defined by Office of Management and Budget, a county or group of counties within a Core Based Statistical Area that contains an urbanized population of at least 2.5 million. A Metropolitan Division consists of one or more main/secondary counties that represent an employment center or centers, plus adjacent counties associated with the main/secondary county or counties through commuting ties.

Metropolitan Statistical Area: An area, defined by the Office of Management and Budget, as a core based statistical area associated with at least one urbanized area that has a population of at least 50,000. The Metropolitan Statistical Area comprises the central county or counties containing the core, plus adjacent outlying counties having a high degree of social and economic integration with the central county or counties as measured through commuting.

Middle-Income: Individual income that is at least 80 percent and less than 120 percent of the area median income, or a median family income that is at least 80 percent and less than 120 percent, in the case of a geography.

Moderate-Income: Individual income that is at least 50 percent and less than 80 percent of the area median income, or a median family income that is at least 50 percent and less than 80 percent, in the case of a geography.

Multifamily: Refers to a residential structure that contains five or more units.

Owner-Occupied Units: Includes units occupied by the owner or co-owner, even if the unit has not been fully paid for or is mortgaged.

Qualified Investment: A qualified investment is defined as any lawful investment, deposit, membership share, or grant that has as its primary purpose community development.

Rating Area: A rated area is a state or multi-state metropolitan statistical area. For an institution with domestic branches in only one state, the institution's CRA rating would be the state rating. If an institution maintains domestic branches in more than one state, the institution will receive a rating for each state in which those branches are located. If an institution maintains domestic branches in two or more states within a multi-state metropolitan statistical area, the institution will receive a rating for the multi-state metropolitan statistical area.

Small Loan(s) to Business(es): A loan included in 'loans to small businesses' as defined in the Consolidated Report of Condition and Income (Call Report) instructions. These loans have original amounts of \$1 million or less and typically are either secured by nonfarm or nonresidential real estate or are classified as commercial and industrial loans.

Small Loan(s) to Farm(s): A loan included in 'loans to small farms' as defined in the instructions for preparation of the Consolidated Report of Condition and Income (Call Report). These loans have original amounts of \$500,000 or less and are either secured by farmland, or are classified as loans to finance agricultural production and other loans to farmers.

Tier 1 Capital: The total of common shareholders' equity, perpetual preferred shareholders' equity with non-cumulative dividends, retained earnings and minority interests in the equity accounts of consolidated subsidiaries.

Upper-Income: Individual income that is at least 120 percent of the area median income, or a median family income that is at least 120 percent, in the case of a geography.
